

Position/Support Web


I recommend using a position/support web to organize your ideas. Let's take a look at how to use it...

- Tour three reasons to support go in the bubbles around the outside.
- Next, try to find supporting details for each reason. You should have at least two for each.



A hook to capture the reader's attention

A thesis that states your argument

Transition from hook to thesis

Thesis

The student's thesis is that eliminating the use of plastic bags will help the environment.

May 28th, 2018, a National Geographic article states that a small male pilot whale was discovered by veterinarians in a Thai Canal near the Malaysia border, struggling to swim. After additional observation, they find that it is unable to breathe because of approximately twenty pounds of plastic in its stomach including eighty plastic bags. The whale vomited up five plastic bags after veterinarians commenced an attempt to extract the plastic from its stomach. Unfortunately the whale perished five days after the attempt was started. Over one million marine creatures, birds and animals die each year from plastic waste. There are 5.25 trillion fragments of plastic debris in the ocean. Just by excluding the usage of plastic bags, we could avert the environment from being harmed further. We could all help save lives of many species and eliminate the avoidable costs.
