LADY KNIGHTS WIN HOOP CLASSIC TOURNEY

The Dr. Losier Middle School Lady Knights won the 5th Annual Miramichi Middle School Hoop Classic, hosting teams from all over New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island. The Knights first game had them pitted against the current AAA Provincial Champion Sussex Classics, suffering a loss of 42-37. Dr. Losier's Player of the Game was awarded to Katie Corlett, who scored a game-high 19 points, with Hustler of the Game going to Meagan MacDiarmid. In Game Two, the Knights faced the Charlottetown Magic, who are the current PEI AAA

Champs. Led by their Player of the Game, Barrie Leggatt, who scored an incredible 31 points, the Knights drew the win at 48-45. Dr. Losier's Hustler of the Game was awarded to Hallie MacEacheron, for her tough play against the tenacious Magic team. Crossovers began on day two, with the Lady Knights and the Lancaster Lynx AAA squad from Saint John going head-to head. Player of the Game, Barrie Leggatt, tallied 22 points for the Knights, with an additional 12 by Katie Corlett, leading Dr. Losier to a 54-47 win. Hustler of the game was earned by Kelsey Hansen. This win gave the Knights a spot in the final game, again taking on the Charlottetown Magic, who defeated George Street AAA Crusader in their own crossover. The Gold Medal Game was a battle, end-for-end. Meagan MacDiarmid, the Player of the Game, dominated on the glass, while Hustler of the Game, Barrie Leggatt, dropped 22 points. Katie Corlett's 12 points and Elizabeth Dickson's 6, netted the win for the Dr. Losier team. This was the Lady Knights' second tournament win in as many weeks. SCHOOL DISTRICT 16 EDUCATION PROGRAM OPTIONS FOR FRENCH LEARNING

School District 16 will be holding a meeting outlining Education Program Options to support French Learning for the 2011-2012 school year. At that time, ALL second language program options will be outlined: The Grade 3 French Immersion entry point, the Late Immersion program (Grade 6 entry) as well as the Pre-Intensive, Intensive and Post Intensive Programs.

The meeting will be held on <u>Tuesday, February 22, at 6:30 P. M.</u> at Dr. Losier Middle School for parents of children residing on both sides of the Miramichi. Administrators, teachers, the Superintendent and French Learning Specialists will be in attendance to answer any questions you may have. **You are strongly encouraged to attend the Parent Information Meeting before making a decision.**

PLEASE NOTE: The deadline for registering a child in either Grade 3 Immersion or Grade 6 Late Immersion is Friday, March 4th. All forms must be received at District 16 Office, where they will be stamped and dated on a first come, first served basis. For parents unable to attend the meetings, immersion registration forms can be obtained at ALL ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS and at School District 16 Office. NOTE: Once a class has been filled at a school offering immersion, a waiting list will be created. A second class MAY OR MAY NOT be created depending on numbers.

WELLNESS WATCH

IMPORTANCE OF STUDENT WELLNESS TO ACADEMIC DEVELOPMENT

Our School Feedback Report reinforces the importance of healthy lifestyle behaviours to student learning. Current research provides evidence of positive associations among the wellness pillars (see below) and measures of students' academic readiness, engagement and success. For example:

HEALTHY EATING: Eating breakfast every day can help improve concentration, and increase students' potential to learn (Public Health Agency of Canada, 2009).

TOBACCO USE: There is an association between tobacco use and low academic achievement and motivation in students; students who use tobacco tend to have lower academic grades than their peers (Morrison and Peterson, 2010).

PHYSICAL ACTIVITY: Active and healthy students have increased levels of concentration, relaxation and focus. Students who succeed academically in school also tend to be more physically active (Public Health Agency of Canada, 2009).

MENTAL FITNESS: The satisfaction of mental fitness needs (competency, relatedness and autonomy) in the educational context has been associated with a range of positive personal and academic outcomes, including enhanced academic self-esteem and engagement, increased scholastic confidence and performance, and decreased likelihood of dropping out of school (Morrison and Peterson, 2010).
